

Analysis Report (2016-17)

Analysis of Student Feedback

- 1. Students are satisfied with the Admission procedure & Fee structure.
- 2. Students are satisfied with infrastructure of Science, Commerce and Law but in Arts faculty more lecture theaters are required in view of large number of students.
- 3. The students want renovation of the play ground.
- 4. College library facility is fair for students of Arts, Science, Commerce and Law.
- 5. The students are satisfied with the faculty, but more teachers are required in view of poor teacher taught ratio.
- 6. Students want more active career counseling and placement cell for their future prospects.
- 7. Students want better health services.
- 8. Students are satisfied with canteen facility.
- 9. The students rate the College as fair and good.
- 10. Students are satisfied with extracurricular activities and cultural activities.
- 11. Students want job oriented courses in the College.

Analysis of Employee's Feedback

- 1. There should be new constructions of class rooms and laboratories.
